I again wish to call the attention of parents to the importance of reporting the christian names of their children to the town clerk immediately after naming them, as a large percentage of the births are reported by physicians, and as children are seldom named until sometime after birth, the physicians are unable to report the name selected. Parents are requested to call and examine the records of births, and make the additions necessary to complete the records.

SUPERINTENDENTS REMARKS

A new system of school books were placed in all the schools at the commencement of the spring term. These books were bought under the direction of the State Supt. of Schools Smith, and Supt. Palmer, of the Bar Harbor schools. The voters of Cranberry Isles have been good to the scholars, and I believe, as a general thing they appreciate the fact, and my impression is that they have taken new interest in their studies. At the beginning of the fall term of school we found only two scholars on Sutton, and thought it advisable to discontinue the school for the time being. Arrangements were made to educate the scholars at an outside expense of \$6.00 per week, thus saving the town as least \$3.00 per week over and above keeping this school. The only outstanding school bills at the close of business Feb. 10th, were as follows: J. H. Branscom one cord wood and board of Philip Bunker not now due.

It is about time to think over seriously the cost of running wood furnaces in school building, Great Cranberry Island. This matter has been taked over for years, but no move made to remedy this unnecessary expense in this section, where the cost of hard wood is so high. It is most certainly a great mistake to try it longer, and I would advise putting in a coal burning furnace before another winter. In the near future, the present school building at Islesford will have to be enlarged, or new building built to accomodate the fast increasing number of scholars. Would it not be good judgement to raise the sum of \$500, at our

next annual meeting in order to be ready later. The Islesford school is growing larger ever year, and something ought to be done to give the children two rooms. Grading these rooms, so the scholars will have the same advantage that the scholars of Cranberry Island have at the present time. I am only looking at this matter in fairness to the Islesford scholars, and I hope to keep working on this line until the general public approve of it. On the whole, the teachers have tried hard to do their part, but just as long as you or I live, we will find fault with some school or some teacher. The schools at present are not perfect, but look back and think if they were any better in your school days, or mine. It has been a very pleasant school year for me, very few complaints and school troubles coming to my attention. The school board have given me almost a free hand, so if mistakes have been made, I am willing to shoulder the whole responsibility. In ending my fourth year as Superintendent of Schools, I want to thank the children for their goodness and many kind considerations.
