#### Remarks

Our schools for the past year have been generally satisfactory but I regret that I have been unable to secure teachers who were all as efficient as might reasonably be expected.

It is worth more to teach some of our schools than we have been paying and we must expect to pay more for some of our teachers in the future.

A great many of our school books are in poor condition and while we have some books in use that are nearly new they are of several different kinds and I think it would be better to sell them and supply our schools with entirely new books and see to it that they are properly cared for.

It has been proposed that we join with the town of Mt. Desert in employing a Superintendent of Schools and I do not hesitate to recommend such a union if we can be assured of the services of a professional superintendent from whom we may receive a proportional amount of service.

I am very grateful to the scholars, teachers, parents and members of the school committee who have assisted in making the school year a successful one.
