

The two additional windows which have long been needed were this year placed in the school building at Islesford and this building was also painted outside. A new window was also put in the southern side of the school room, at Bakers, and as the light is often poor in the school room at Sutton it would seem advisable to place at least one additional window in the northern side of that building.

Additional seats and blackboards will have to be added to the Islesford school, unless a new school building is to be built there, in the near future.

The furnace pipes at Cranberry, should again be repaired and some provision made to insure better sanitary conditions in and about that school building, than have existed in the past.

A few other minor repairs have been, and could be made, that would be of benefit, but it is often difficult to find anyone who will take these small jobs and therefore some of them have to wait.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REMARKS

At the beginning of my duties as Superintendent, I visited a number of schools in nearby towns for the purpose of observing the methods used, and the results obtained there, and while I found many new and interesting features, I came home convinced that on the whole, our schools were as good as those in most other towns, and that the most essential thing of all, was to secure good teachers and retain them even though it became necessary to increase their wages in order to do so.

With that object in view, I engaged the very best teachers that could be secured at reasonable wages, and I think nearly

everyone who has followed the progress of our schools during the past few years, will agree that at no time within their memory have we enjoyed better schools than the winter terms just closed

Much credit is due the teachers for these gratifying results, but the scholars and parents have contributed largely to this success; and in the face of the most trying misfortunes which befell some of our schools through sickness last fall, many of them acted most praiseworthy.

It is with regret that I feel it my duty to mention that there is still a spirit of lawlessness, which, from time time, keeps cropping out among some of our boys and causes them to destroy the town's property. I have talked to them many times in regard to these instances, but fear it will take at least one prosecution to make them realize that the wanton destruction of property is no joke.

A new school building will soon be needed at Islesford, and I think it would be advisable to raise a sum of money each year to have in readiness, when desired for such purpose.

I wish it had been possible for me to devote more time to school work, for I feel that none of us spend as much time as we should in our schools, and it is with the hope that some one more competent, who can give the cause the attention it deserves, can be secured, that I thank you for the honor which I have enjoyed, and announce that I am not a candidate for reelection to the office of Superintendent of Schools.
