REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

The past year will be remembered as one of extensive repairs, heavy expenses and some overdraws. Such a heavy overdraw was unavoidable. It was exceedingly difficult for an inexperienced person to estimate the cost of running the schools the past year. Some of the expenses, board, for instance, were miscalculated, as were the teachers' and janitors' wages. Again, the fuel bill amounted to more than I expected it would. I realize that a man could have made a better estimate of the amount needed than I. However, I feel that in most cases the people have received full benefit of the money expended, and trust they will be just in considering the matter.

During the year three meetings of the superintending school committee were held. The first was to appoint the superintendent of schools. The second was to consider the amount of repairs to be made. The third was to decide what wages should be paid the janitors for the winter term, as well as of the grammar school teacher at Cranberry Island.

The teachers' wages have been higher this year than formerly. It is necessary to employ the best teachers ob-

tainable, as the citizens of Cranberry Isles are satisfied with only the best.

It is hard to get teachers to come to the islands, but after teaching a few weeks here, they are generally anxious to return for another term. The salary per week is fair. If we could offer teachers 36 weeks, which is the average length of the school year in towns of this size throughout the State, they would be more willing to come

for what we pay.

It costs about \$80 a week to pay the common school expenses. Therefore, to continue the school for 34 weeks would cost about \$2,720. I think that the State will be willing to pay the expenses of one week again this year. If it should, only 33 weeks' expenses need to be paid by the town. I am not going to estimate the amount needed to run the schools for the ensuing year. There need be no money raised for text-books. I think Cranberry Island is well supplied with books; of course, a few will have to be bought. They are in need of readers at Islesford. The grammar grades have read all that is required, and as those bought will be supplementary readers, I will offer no suggestions. The primary room will need four "Stepping Stones to Literature", Book Four, Silver, Burdett & Co. and six Jones' Second Readers, Ginn & Company.

No money need be raised to pay the tuition of those who are attending high school for the ensuing year.

The superintending school committee has been real "supporters of the cause" this year as well as in other years, and many repairs of value to the welfare and comfort of both teachers and pupils have been accomplished. However, not all their ambitions were realized.

The chemical closets need to be finished on Great Cranberry Island. A coal bin is needed in the school basement at Islesford, and another water tank is needed

there. It would be well to have paper drinking-cups used, and excellent to have paper towels, by the use of which the books would be kept in better condition. Should towels be bought, I have two basins to donate. The teachers report instances where children borrow each other's drinking cups—so much for individual drinking cups. If \$70 could be raised for utensils, etc., paper towels and cups could be bought.

Curtains are needed on the western side of the grammar room Cranberry Island. The school building on Cranberry Island would be more pleasing to the children if the walls could be painted.

The repairs on Cranberry Island's school building consisted of a door being put into the lower hall and primary school entry. A new hot water furnace was installed, which has converted cold rooms to comfortable ones. There is heat enough to allow a free circulation of fresh air on the cold days, as well as warm, which improves the ventilation of the building. A coal-bin has been built and the door to the basement has been locked. Water tanks have been put in with sinks and drainage pipes. A new step-ladder was bought for Islesford school building and a set of very good maps. It was necessary that the school building at Islesford be furnished with more pipes, which gives the room sufficient heat.

Several of the parents of the eighth grade pupils are in favor of adding a ninth grade to the school system, at the beginning of the next fall term. As we have no high school, it seems a wise thing to do. Perhaps some of the pupils who cannot go away to continue their education at a high school would go to school the other year and enjoy the privilege of taking the most essential studies over, with perhaps an extra study or two to stimulate their interest.

Our primary schools this year have shown a vast im-

provement, especially in reading, the Ward system being used. If a community wishes to have good results in the grammar schools later on, attention must be paid to the

primary school work.

Children must have some incentive to work if one wishes their work to be profitable. Is it not an incentive to demand that they attain a certain per cent. in all studies in order to gain promotion? The examinations given last spring were given to encourage the pupils to do their best work. Of course it was new and perhaps not understood by them, but I think they have done better this year than last. However, they can do better than they have if they will only try harder and think that school is where they ought to work, not because they must but because they desire to do so.

If the parents of children who are five years old before the beginning or during the spring term would send them at the beginning of the spring term, they could do what is called sub-primary work; that is, complete the primer that term and be ready for the first grade in the fall. Otherwise they will have to be retained a year in the first grade, as not many children can do the subprimary and first grade-work in one year.

In Hon. Payson Smith's talk at the dedication of the new school building at Islesford, he emphasized the need of retaining a teacher in a school year after year. He asked if a child's life would be a success if it had a new mother every twelve weeks? Miss Morrill does not care to return for the spring term. The others would be pleased to continue their work here in the spring. It is with pleasure that I can recommend each of them as efficient and successful teachers.

The janitors have done their work well. Cranberry Island was fortunate to get Charles Gott to do the work for the fall and winter terms, and everything shows that

considerable attention has been given to the work. Mr. Phippen has made a decided change for the better everywhere in the school building at Islesford, and money would be saved by his retention.

On April 1, 1914, there were in town 109 persons between the ages of 5 and 21 years; a decrease from last year. Five of them will be 21 by April 1, 1915. There are five more to come in and possibly more. Therefore, the State money will not decrease.

I wish to thank the citizens of Cranberry Isles for the many kindnesses and favors I have received of them. Though I am not a candidate for the office of superintendent for the ensuing year, it is my desire to see the children advance and become more interested in their work. I have experienced much pleasure in doing the work, and sincerely hope that the next year will be more profitable to the children than the last.

To Alonzo J. Bryant, a constable of the town of Cranberry Isles, in said County.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Cranberry Isles, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at town hall, in said town, on Monday, the first day of March, A. D. 1915, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE I To choose by ballot a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- 2 To choose by ballot a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the several town officers.
- 4 To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor.
- 5 To choose a town agent for the ensuing year.
- 6 To choose an auditor of accounts for the ensuing year.
- 7 To choose by ballot one member S S committee for the term of three years.
- 8 To choose by ballot a town treasurer for the ensuing year, and vote his pay.
- 9 To choose by ballot a collector of taxes for the ensuing year, and vote his compensation.
- To choose by ballot a caretaker of town hall for the ensuing year, and vote his pay.
- To see if the caretaker of town hall shall let and have charge of hall in connection with selectmen.
- 12 To choose truant officers for the ensuing year.
- 13 To choose constables for the ensuing year.
- 14 To see how many road commissioners the town will vote to have the ensuing year.
- To choose surveyors of lumber and measurers of wood and bark for the ensuing year.
- 16 To choose fence-viewers for the ensuing year.
- 17 To choose pound-keepers for the ensuing year.
- 18 To choose suitable places for town pounds on the several islands for the ensuing year.
- To see if the town will vote to continue school No. 5 this year.

- 20 To see if the town will vote to continue school No. 6 this year.
- 21 To see how many weeks of school the town will vote to have the ensuing year.
- To see if the town will vote to have printed reports for A. D. 1915.
- To see if the town will vote and authorize the S. S. committee to employ a school physician, according to chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909.
- 24 To see if the town will vote to let the Hancock county Y. M. C. A have free use of town hall the ensuing year.
- 25 To elect a fire ward in accordance with the requirements of chapter 108 of the Public Laws of Maine of 1913.
- 26 To see if the town will accept the town way as rerun by the selectmen near the home of Arthur M. Spurling, as per vote of town.
- 27 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$307.50 to pay interest on new schoolhouse notes 1914-15.
- 28 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on note due August 15, 1915.
- To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907 as amended by chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1915.
- 30 To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$533, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
