REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

William F. Stanley, Baker's Island, Arthur A. Joy, Cranberry Island.

Walter Hadlock, Chairman, Islesford.

Mrs. Jennie A. Stanley, Secretary, Cranberry Island.

This year the members of the superintending school committee have been called on to do more work than formerly; necessitated by the poor health, and later death, of a member, Mr. Joy, who took an active part in school affairs.

A record of every meeting of this committee since 1913 has been kept. It has been the aim of the committee to have the approbation of all the members before making any important changes. Under such favorable conditions, business becomes a pleasure, and duty easy to perform.

As you read the financial report, you will notice that the expenses of the winter term, 1916, are only one-half paid. We decided that it would cause less friction to settle only bills contracted before Feb. 10, 1916. We hope that this step may meet with the approval of all.

REPAIRS.

A fine commodious coal bin has been built in the basement at Islesford. A window must be cut in the cellar wall so that the bin can be filled conveniently.

The chemical closets that were installed by Mr. Bry-

ant have proved to be just the thing thus far. Should they prove as satisfactory during the summer months, we feel as though the money was well expended.

New desks were put into the primary room at Islesford. They are not like the old ones, but we thought it advisable to buy the best. When others are needed, we advocate that the Heywood Eclipse be bought; thus, in time, the seats will be alike.

The expenses were so heavy this year, it was thought better not to paint the walls of the school building on Great Cranberry island. However, it ought to be done next year. An attractive school room is an incentive to study.

The Baker Island schoolhouse needs renovating. New curtains have been bought this year for the windows.

We think that a pump or suitable material should be bought with which the pipes in the furnaces can be filled. Up to this time the town has had to borrow, which is unsatisfactory to all concerned.

The cellar drain in the school building on Great Cranberry island needs attention. This fact has but recently been presented to us.

FUNDS NEEDED.

This year \$2,000 was raised for the common schools. It would be well to raise the same amount for expenditures for the ensuing year.

Undoubtedly there is money enough to keep the schools supplied with necessary books for the ensuing year, but perhaps it would be well to raise the sum of \$50, so as to keep up the fund.

Fifty dollars should be raised to pay the tuition of those who attend high school for the ensuing year.

The sum of \$300 is requested for the purpose of

repairing the school property for the ensuing year.

The sum of \$75 is needed for utensils, etc. A great many things have to be bought with this fund. We have not had sufficient money to work with for the good of our primary schools.

The pupils here have not received medical examination since 1914. We sanction the town raising \$30 in order that a physician may be obtained to do the work.

JANITORS and IMPROVEMENTS.

We are delighted with the way in which our janitors have performed their duties this year. Under their faithful and competent management the school buildings have not been unnecessarily knocked. The yards have been kept neat.

We hope the work on the school grounds, started last fall by the league members on Cranberry island, will be continued when climatic conditions are favorable. The school lawn at Islesford needs to be seeded down.

The league has done good work in both schools. Four desk chairs have been purchased, one for each room. The Islesford league has bought two pencil sharpeners and a large dictionary and stand. Both leagues deserve praise for their hard work.

TEACHERS.

The teachers are active and energetic. Three hold State certificates, and two, permits. What they lack in training is made up in teaching experience. It would be difficult to find teachers who would take more interest in the welfare of their pupils. We wish that their efforts might be duly appreciated by all, and that they might receive the good will and loyal support of all the citizens.

ATTENDANCE IN SCHOOLS.

The average attendance in our grammar schools is not what it ought to be. Pupils under fifteen give less trouble

than those who are older. However, there are a few that are attending this winter regularly, which is very gratifying to those who are striving to promote education in our town. We sincerely hope that next year will show a larger attendance than ever in all the schools.

NUMBER of SCHOLARS.

On April 1, 1915 there were in town 116 persons between the ages of 5 and 21 years. Four will be 21 by April 1, 1916. We expect there will be more than that number to enter the list next April.
