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

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS IMPORTANT

ALL TAXPAYERS SHOULD READ THE FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS AND COMPLY WITH THEM

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930.

"Before making an assessement, the Assessors shall give seasonable notice in writing to the Inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in Town, or shall notify them, in such other ways as the Town at its Annual Meeting directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner after such notice, does not bring in such lists, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes unless he offers such lists with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed "





SCHOOL REPORT

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Cranberry Isles:

I submit herewith the annual report of the schools of this town, with a complete statement of the receipts and disbursements.

The financial report probably requires but little, if any, explanation. The expenditures vary only slightly from year to year, since the major part of the funds goes for items of predetermined cost. The present budget, except in occasional emergencies, is adequate for the maintenance of the schools on the present standards. You will note an overdraft in the repair account, due to the unavoidable necessity of installing a new furnace at the Cranberry Island school. The heating plant installed is a thoroughly modern and efficient hot water system, and will not only improve the health conditions within the building, but will be also much more economical to operate.

The past year has seen some changes in the faculties of both schools. Although changes are not always desirable, we must bear in mind that they are sometimes unavoidable. The small school, and particularly the isolated school, is not always able to pay salaries sufficiently large to hold good teachers over an extended period. The larger towns present attractions, with single-grade systems and higher wages, which draw the better teachers from the smaller schools. We do believe, however, that it is advisable to have the best teachers, even though we are not able to hold them more than one or two years.

We regret the loss of several teachers during this past year. Mr. Harvey Kelley, who taught the Islesford grammar school two consecutive years with most satisfactory results, is now studying toward his college degree. He was replaced by Mr. Warren Hill, a graduate of the four-year training course at Gorham normal school. Mrs. Lennie Hambro, who taught the primary grades of Islesford last year, has retired from the profession. Miss Gertrude Stanley, who came to us from the

Clifton schools, is doing commendable work in the Islesford primary. Miss Stanley had two years of training at Castine normal school, with special training for her present position at Farmington normal last summer.

Mr. Ralph Springer is completing his second year in the grammar school at Cranberry Island. We believe that he has done an excellent piece of work in that school. Miss Wilda Dean, a graduate of the three-year training course at Wheelock School replaced Miss Irma MacLeod, who had taught the primary grades with marked success for several years, and who is now completing her work at Gorham normal school. Miss Dean was recently offered a position in the schools of Derby, Maine, and her resignation took effect on January 19 last. The primary position is now held by Miss Eleanor Cleaves, a graduate of the three-year course at Gorham normal school. Miss Cleaves taught the primary school at Ottawa last year.

We have attempted some changes in organization and administration during the past year and a half. We believe that they have proved worthwhile and beneficial. The quality of the teaching, and the influence of the teachers on the boys and girls, has been of high quality. We would, at this time, commend to your attention one urgent need of the schools of this town. Children of school age need constant attention to their physical welfare. We believe that the services of a school nurse, at regular intervals, would be a very decided asset to the welfare of the pupils. It is so frequently true that physical handicaps discovered and corrected at an early age prevent so much trouble in later years. We would propose, therefore, that an appropriation of \$50 be made annually, and expended for the services of Miss Katherine Noble, the school nurse at Southwest Harbor. Miss Noble would be available at least two days per term, and would visit both school and homes in an attempt to improve health conditions of the You would find her an excellent type of woman to help with the health problems of the communities.

In closing this report, may we again call attention to the fact that we stand ready to serve the communities in every possible manner. We welcome constructive criticism of the schools. We are always glad to talk over problems with any parent or citizen. Misunderstanding too frequently is the cause of criticism, and we urge that parents acquaint themselves with school conditions and school problems, rather

than accept the opinions of other. We sincerely request your cooperation with and your loyal support of the teachers who are serving you.

To the teachers, janitors, school committee, and the citizens in general, I express my personal appreciation of their loyal cooperation.

To Andrew E. Stanley, a Constable of the Town of Cranberry Isles, in said county, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Cranberry Isles, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Neighborhood House, Little Cranberry Island, in said town, on Monday, the fourth day of March, A. D. 1940, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1 To choose by ballot a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- 2 To choose by ballot a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To hear and act on reports of town officers.
- 4 To choose by ballot three selectmen, who shall be assessors and overseers of poor.
- 5 To choose by ballot a treasurer, and vote his compensation.
- 6 To choose by ballot a collector of taxes, and vote his compensation.
- 7 To choose by ballot a collector of automobile excise tax, and vote his compensation.
- 8 To choose by ballot one member of superintending school committee for three years.
- 9 To choose constables for the ensuing year.
- 10 To choose by ballot, road commissioners for the ensuing year, and vote their pay.
- 11 To choose by ballot surveyors of lumber and measurers of wood and bark for the ensuing year.
- 12 To see if the town will vote to hold the next annual meeting at Town Hall, Great Cranberry Island.

13 To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money for schools, under this joint budget, to be accounted for separately.

- 37 To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State-aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.
- 38 To choose a town auditor for the ensuing year.
- 39 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell and dispose of all tax titles held by the town on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.
- 40 To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to view taxable property.
- 41 To see if the town will vote to transfer mothers' aid account on balance from contingent account to pay overdraft on repairs of school property.
- 42 To see if the town will vote to set the amount to be charged for rent of Town Hall per night.
- 43 To see what sum the town will vote for pay of caretaker; for Town Hall.
- 44 To see if the town will vote to fence in whole or part of the school ground at Islesford, and raise a sum of money for same.
- 45 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- 46 To vote pay of moderator for his services.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding on applications of those claiming the right to have their names upon said list, at the Neighborhood House, Little Cranberry Island, in said town, at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
