At the present time we have two children that are a direct expense to the town. Celia White is very comfortable at the Female Orphan asylum, Portland, and the price for her board is \$2 per week. Lida White has had so many homes the past year it is almost impossible to keep track of her. I understand from good authority that she is so ugly and disagreeable that families taking her on trial only keep her a few weeks and return her to the Children's Home. At present she is boarding with a family in Appleton, Me., and the price for board is \$3 a week. A few weeks ago I made application to try to get Lida in the Female Orphan asylum, Portland. After looking up her history in other homes they decided not to take her. All other children coming under our charge March 4, 1918 have good homes and are in no way an expense to the town of Cranberry Isles.

The city of Brewer has an account which they claim will have to be paid, due, as they claim, for board and expenses of Phyllis Jarvis during 1917-18. The account has not been settled, as it has never been proved to my satisfaction that we are directly responsible for the account, and even if this were the fact, it is altogether a very unreasonable bill, and I advise not to settle under the present conditions.

We would advise raising the sum of \$350 for the support of the poor the ensuing year.

REPORT
 OF
 SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

*To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of
 the Town of Cranberry Isles:—*

I have the honor to submit for your consideration my first annual report of the condition, progress and needs of the schools of Cranberry Isles.

I find the schoolrooms to be in excellent condition, well ventilated, well heated and everything pertaining to the pupils' comfort attended to.

I have made out a course of study on the eight-grade system, so that these schools may receive a strong foundation for a higher education. This course of study is used in all other schools of the district, and I am planning to adopt the same text-books as other schools, so that each and every school will be on the same plane of efficiency.

TEACHERS.

Owing to the scarcity of teachers, it has been difficult to procure such teachers as the pupils of Cranberry Isles should have. I might have engaged teachers for these schools, and have wasted that much money, but, happily, this did not happen. Now, citizens, just a word in regard to these teachers. I have visited your schools more than is required of me by law, I have watched the interest manifested by these teachers, I have examined the pupils, and now offer you this advice: Do not lose these teachers, because of a few dollars; show your appreciation of their work by increasing their

salaries so that they cannot refuse to come back another year. Changing teachers every term has been the cause of poor schools more than anything else. These teachers are better acquainted with each other, and I firmly believe the pupils will be in a still better condition another year with these same teachers back.

ATTENDANCE.

The attendance has been remarkably good; no cases of truancy reported to me. I have distinctly stated my position in regard to pupils from seven to fifteen years of age attending school, and, happily, there has been no need of enforcing the truancy law. Because of the epidemic of influenza, it became necessary to close the schools a short time, and Islesford grammar school was so unfortunate as to lose one of its brightest pupils. The hearty sympathy of the pupils and the school department is extended to the relatives in their bereavement.

TEXT-BOOKS.

I have started to adopt a uniform system of text-books in the schools of the district, so that all the pupils might have the same chance. The books which I have placed in these schools are up to date, deal with the problems of to-day, and are of vital importance to the pupils. I would recommend an increase in the appropriation in order to make the system complete by the end of the ensuing year.

MUSIC AND DRAWING.

I would heartily recommend that music and drawing be introduced in the schools the ensuing year, thus placing us on the same plane as the schools of Mt Desert and Southwest Harbor.

REPAIRS.

Slight repairs have been made wherever necessary, and the schools kept in the best condition possible. A few recitation seats are needed at the Islesford primary school.

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN.

Dr. Neal has examined the pupils thoroughly, with the following results:—69 examined, 5 deficient in eyesight, 1 deficient in hearing. Notices were sent to all the parents.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

In making my recommendations for the ensuing year, I wish to state that I have made a careful study of the needs of the schools, and am asking for just what I believe to be actually needed, no more and no less.
