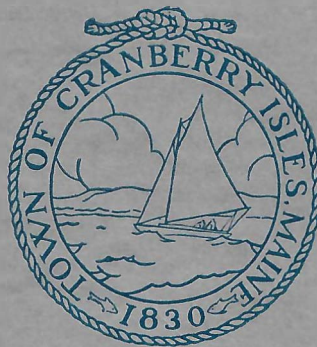

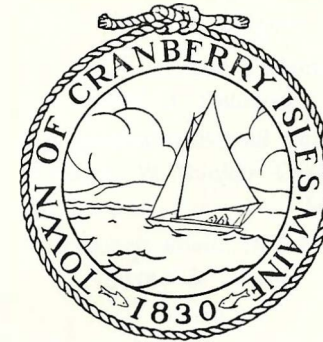
NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS IMPORTANT

ALL TAXPAYERS SHOULD READ THE FOLLOWING
REQUIREMENTS AND COMPLY WITH THEM

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930.

"Before making an assessment, the Assessors shall give seasonable notice in writing to the inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in Town, or shall notify them in such other ways as the Town at its Annual Meeting directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner after such notice, does not bring in such lists, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes unless he offers such lists with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed."

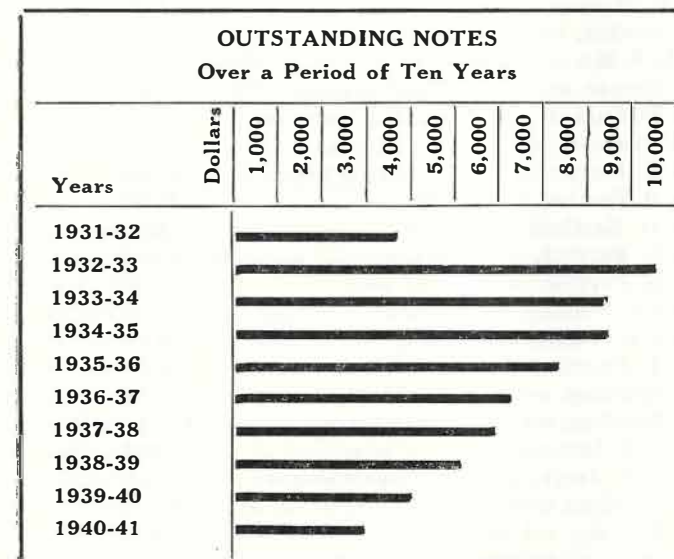

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

1940

During the past year reportable diseases have been at a minimum, resulting in one case of German Measles, one of Chicken Pox and one of Mumps. Care was taken in each case to prevent the disease from spreading.

One dead deer drifted ashore in Bunkers Head Cove and was disposed of by burying.

Vaccination time is here!

Someone might ask, "Why all this agitation about smallpox vaccination? The Health Director said not long ago there hasn't been a case of smallpox in Maine during the past ten years."

The above statement is true, but there is no reason why there may not be many cases next year among those who are not protected by vaccination.

During the period 1936 and 1938, smallpox cases appeared in every state in the United States except Maine and nine other states.

In one state, cases have been found to occur at the rate of 124 per 100,000 population; in five states at the rate of more than fifty cases per 100,000 population.

Some important facts about the disease itself:

1. It is the most "catching" of all diseases.
2. It may and frequently does cause death.
3. It almost always disfigures.
4. It is easily prevented by vaccination, and our laws provide that every town and city shall offer free vaccination to all their inhabitants annually, the first of March.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their co-operation during my three years as health officer.

SCHOOL REPORT

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Cranberry Isles:

I submit herewith the annual report of the schools of this Town, with a statement of the receipts and expenditures.

The financial report is practically the same as in former years, and probably requires no explanation. We have carried over a small balance, and all outstanding bills have been paid.

It is very probable, with the present industrial outlook, that many items of the school supply type will increase rapidly in price during the coming year. The balance carried over in the general school fund will be more than ample, however, to absorb this increase.

We have recommended, for the ensuing year, an increased repair fund. The interior of the Islesford School should be repainted before getting in too bad condition. This appears to be the only major item to be covered by this account.

The past year has been somewhat unusual in the number of changes which have taken place in the teaching force. These changes are not desirable, and we always regret the circumstances, whatever they may be, which bring them into effect. Situations sometimes arise, however, in which there seems to be no other solution, and, very frequently, they prove to be advantageous. We regret that Mr. Warren Hill was unable to return to the Islesford School last September. He gave up his position that he might continue his education at college. The school was fortunate in securing the services of Richard Goodridge, a graduate of the four year normal course at Gorham. Miss Gertrude Stanley returned for her second year with the Islesford primary room. Mr. Ralph Springer, who taught the Cranberry Isles grammar school during the past two years, accepted a better position in the Presque Isles schools. We were sorry, indeed, to lose his services. The position was taken in September by Mr. Gordon Harmon, a graduate of Presque Isle Normal School. Mr. Harmon decided, however, that he did not wish to complete the school year, and so resigned at the Thanksgiving recess. The position is now held by Mr. Lawrence Standish, a graduate of Farmington Normal School, with several years of successful experience. Miss Eleanor Cleaves, who taught the Cranberry Island primary school during the latter half of last year, married during the summer and therefore did not return. Miss Sarah Leighton, a Presque Isle graduate, held the position until the Thanksgiving recess, when she

accepted a better position. Miss Margaret Mulrooney, a graduate of Farmington Normal School, is now teaching the primary grades with excellent success.

It is our sincere hope that additional changes will be unnecessary during the coming months. We must recognize the fact, however, that the present industrial and defense program is going to have a definite effect upon the teaching profession. The scarcity of good trained teachers is already being keenly felt, and may become quite serious within a short time. The isolated schools, with medium salary schedules, are the ones which will notice the effect first.

During the past year, because of an extreme reduction in the national export trade, a wide variety of surplus food commodities have been made available to schools throughout the nation. The Cranberry Isles schools have not been able to utilize many of these foods, due to lack of facilities for handling and preparing them. We have requested shipments of fruits and fruit juices, however, and we believe that these things are well worth the small investment necessary to cover the shipping charge. They should pay dividends in terms of pupil health welfare, and in the improved response to class work which can be secured by such small items as recess lunches of fruit.

There has been some question regarding the service of the Health Nurse, during the past year. The appropriation raised for her services has not been entirely expended, since she has not given as much time as anticipated to the Island schools. It is her desire to conduct at least one clinic there during the coming year, providing some of the health services such as inoculations or vaccinations. She feels that this is one manner in which she could definitely serve the community, and give the Town returns on the investment. We feel confident that the nursing service will be considerably better during the coming year than it has during the past one.

One of the outstanding needs of the schools, is a playground on Cranberry Island. It is most unfortunate, indeed, that there is no suitable area in connection with the school. Boys and girls need opportunity to expend their physical energies. They need to have their recreational activities directed along worth-while lines. Supervised play is a difficult problem, however, if a school lacks a playground. If any solution can be offered it will be much appreciated.

We note that there have been a number of boys and girls who have not continued their education beyond the elementary school grades. Probably in some cases the financial problems have been the reason. We believe that, unless it is impossible for these young people to secure the funds to permit them to enter high school, they should be urged to continue their studies. Elementary training is

entirely inadequate for the demands of the present day. It may possibly become advisable for the elementary school to add more advanced courses to the present curriculum to care for these young people who are unable to continue. We cannot offer them a secondary education in the grammar school, but we could give them some work which would have very definite practical value.

In spite of the many interruptions of the past year, it has been, we believe, a successful one. The schools are running smoothly, without friction, and there is a splendid spirit of cooperation. The standard of work is high. The teachers are giving of their best, and good work is being done. We urge parents and citizens to visit and know their schools. You will find the teachers always willing to discuss the problems which are common to home and school. A genuine cooperation between parent and teacher can do much toward the advancement of the welfare of the pupil. Your constructive criticism is always welcome.

In closing this report, I would express my personal appreciation of the loyal support and the ready cooperation which has been extended by parents, teachers and School Committee members during the past year. We look forward to continued progress in the months ahead.

- 14 To see what sum of money shall be raised for necessary town charges.
- 15 To see what sum of money shall be raised for support of the poor.
- 16 To see what action the town will take in regard to street lights and raise sum of money for same.
- 17 To see what sum the town will appropriate for State-aid road construction (in additions to amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of section 19, chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of section 3, chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- 18 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for maintenance of State-aid highway, according to the provisions of sections 9, 18, 36 and 37, chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of Maine, and specify amount of each island.
- 19 To see what sum of money shall be raised for highways on the different islands.
- 20 To see what sum of money shall be raised for snow removal on the different islands.
- 21 To see what sum of money shall be raised for insurance on school buildings.
- 22 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for tarring State-aid roads.
- 23 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs and maintenance of public wharf and float.
- 24 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" in regard to extending the town wharf, Great Cranberry Island, into deeper water, and raise a sum of money for same.
- 25 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to renew wharf permit of Eber L. Spurling for a term of one year, and act thereon.

- 26 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$70.00 for superintendent of schools' office rent.
- 27 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for superintendent of schools' salary.
- 28 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on notes.
- 29 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on principal of note.
- 30 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for extermination of mosquitoes, and to whom paid.
- 31 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to make temporary loan, or loans, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$4,000, in anticipation of, and to be paid out of, the current taxes for the municipal year of 1941.
- 32 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue the town's negotiable notes or bonds in a sum not exceeding \$3,000 for the purpose of refunding, renewing or paying certain indebtedness of the town due now or to become due during the year 1941, to wit: Arthur M. Spurling, note for \$1,500, due July 1, 1941; Leslie M. Rice, note for \$1,500, due July 1, 1941.
- 33 To see if the town will vote to elect a fire warden, according to section 6 of chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- 34 To vote pay of town officers, labor and trucks.
- 35 To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State-aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.
- 36 To choose a town auditor for the ensuing year.
- 37 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell and dispose of all tax titles held by the town on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.
- 38 To see if the town will vote to accept and maintain a road as laid out by the selectmen on petition of Florence V. Stanley and others and act thereon.
- 39 To see if the town will vote to set the amount to be charged for rent of Town Hall per night.

- 40 To see what sum the town will vote for pay of caretaker for Town Hall.
- 41 To see if the town will vote to fence in whole or part of the school ground at Islesford, and raise a sum of money for same.
- 42 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- 43 To vote pay of moderator for his services.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding on applications of those claiming the right to have their names upon said list, at the Neighborhood House, Little Cranberry Island, in said town, at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
